Council President Pat Staples has played a “traffic cop” role in negotiating some practical solutions for residents and businesses. Meeker will become one-way from Hopple to Spring Grove with no 18-wheeler trucks allowed. Avon Place will remain two ways to accommodate the smaller trucks of Northside Meats. Signs should be up in November. The traffic engineering staff – Steve Bailey, John Childress and Steve Niemeier – have all been top notch to work with.

Through the leadership of the Camp Washington Community Board, we have begun work on a marketing and redevelopment plan, and have created a clearinghouse for investment, Brownfield, environmental concerns.

With over 140 businesses, Camp Washington is one of the most business-oriented powerhouses in the region. Camp Washington is the gateway off I-75 to the Uptown area, led by UC, which is directing a \$1.3 billion residential and commercial investment. The City is implementing a redevelopment plan in Lower Price Hill, and is looking at Camp Washington as the next focal point to help attract new businesses to the City.
